What an exciting time for Salem Lutheran Church.

Anytime you start something new or different it is exciting and scary at the same time. This is true for the members and staff of Salem too. With Pastor John's resignation after 26 plus years that leaves a big hole in our lives. I know that Salem will go on and I wish Pastor John God's guidance in his life.

The council has been working with Pastor Vicki Taylor of the NE Synod. Pastor Taylor will be our support and contact person from the Synod office. She met with the church council last month and recommended that Salem take time to make the adjustments needed for a new pastor. We do this by taking our time hiring a new pastor.

Here is the information the council received about interim ministry.

A Concept of Interim Ministry

Intentional Interim Ministry is a relatively new concept of ministry. It differs from the usual practice of ministry in several ways. Its chief focus is ministry to a congregation in the abnormal setting of a pastoral vacancy. The needs of congregations in that situation are unique. In order to ease the anxiety of persons in such congregations and let them "rest easier" the intentional interim pastor will provide competent pastoral ministry to the congregation.

In the event that the congregation is experiencing an unusual amount of conflict the task expands to try to provide an atmosphere which will allow for constructive resolution of the conflict.

Characteristics of a Vacant Congregation

When a resident pastor leaves there is a very significant impact on the congregation and its members. That impact demands a period of adjustment. That adjustment is called "grieving". Whenever change takes place there will be a grieving process as the person or congregation adjusts to what has happened. It makes little difference whether, in the case of congregations, the pastor left for good reason or bad. *There has been a significant impact on that congregation to which it has no choice but to adjust.*

Unfortunately the most obvious solution to their situation is also the least effective in the long run. That solution is to call another pastor. If that takes place before that adjustment has come about there will be a tendency to find a copy of the departed pastor or, when the relationship is bad, someone who is not like the former pastor. Both objectives are fraught with danger and disappointment is almost a certainty. That is why succeeding pastors have had difficulty, especially following a long and deeply appreciated ministry. Everything will be evaluated in light of a somewhat nostalgic image of how good a pastor the former pastor was. No one is that competent! That is the great danger of the *quick fix*.

The Interim Period is an Opportunity

While a congregation is without a regularly called pastor is a good time to realize its own identity. How has the previous pastor's time with them influenced who they have become? How have they grown in their faith during that time: Whose ministry is this, anyway? What role should a pastor play in the ministry of this congregation? Now for the other side: What did Pastor John fail to help grow? Is that truly essential to this congregation's ministry? (Ministry truly is a congregational rather than a cleric responsibility.)

Over the time of an Intentional Interim's service the congregation will hopefully come to understand itself much more thoroughly than it possibly ever has and then will be in a much better position to do an effective and satisfying job of calling its next pastor. That is the true objective.

Council Minit-Highlights

September 14, 2011

“Seeking Clarity in Mission and Ministry”

Our Mission Statement:

“Celebrating Christ’s Love Through Hearts That Care and Hands That Share”

Welcome to the new council members - Anderson welcomed the new council members and thanked them for serving on the council. This is an exciting time for Salem.

Pastor's Report - Anderson handed out Pastor Monson's final monthly written report.

Financial Secretary Report - Last month the council asked Waldera to do a report showing the pledge amount for 2011 compared to actual giving. According to the report the pledges over giving are down 33% as of the end of August. The council then asked Waldera to look at the total general fund giving for the same time period for 2011, 2010 and 2009. That way it will give the council more information about the total income. Waldera also stated that for 2012 there are fewer pledges but the average pledge is higher than in 2011.

Waldera also reported that he spoke to Tom Dollins about the damage to the rental tents used at VBS. Dollins told Waldera that there are no extra charges to the church for the damages. The council discussed purchasing the tents. No action was taken.

Old Business - Trampe discussed a Memorial Policy and Master Plan for the church grounds. The council decided to set up a committee to do the research. Trampe/Fischer/passed: The council will establish a committee to review suggested memorial policy and to develop a master plan for the church grounds. Trampe volunteered to be on the committee. A notice will be placed in the church bell and in the bulletins.

New Business - Anderson handed out a short job description of all the committees for the new members to review prior to assigning liaisons.

Election of officers - There was some discussion about Strausser's eligibility to be on the council. Johnson disputed her eligibility because this is her "fifth year" on council. The council decided that since she was elected for a two year term by the congregation that she should have the privilege of fulfilling her term. Strausser is in the second year of her second two year term. Limburg/Sjodin/passed: Elect Larry Nelson as president, Terry Daudt as Vice President, and Sharon Fischer as Secretary. Nelson was not at the meeting; Anderson will talk to him when he returns.

Dear Members and Friends of Salem,

I greet you in Jesus name as your new church council president. Since we are without a pastor I will try to keep you informed and up to date. I know that many of you will be grieving the loss of Pastor John since he resigned. I am also aware that there has been some conflict. We will need God's help and some time to work through these issues. Whenever there has been a long pastorate and/or conflict the church has learned that an interim pastor is needed to prepare the way before a new pastor is called. In my former parish there had been considerable conflict so there was an interim pastor before I was called. When I retired I had been there 23 years. There was no appreciable conflict but because of a long pastorate an interim pastor was there before a new pastor was called.

The Northeast Minnesota Synod Staff will be working with us and will recommend names of available interim pastors. The church council will then look at the information about these pastors and choose one for Salem. We hope that this will happen as soon as possible but it will depend upon the availability of suitable candidates.

In the meantime we will be filling in on Sundays with myself and the other retired pastors in the congregation. We may also need to turn to other supply pastors from the area. Be assured that we will do our best to maintain Salem's ministry until an interim Pastor is in place. Please keep Salem and the council in your prayers. We also ask your patience during this time.

I hope and pray that we will come together as a congregation and work together to carry out Salem's mission. In my sermon on Sunday, Sept. 25, I closed with some verses from Galatians 6:7-10. In that lesson the Apostle Paul says this "Don't be misled; No one makes a fool of God. What a person plants, he will harvest. The person who plants selfishness, ignoring the needs of others - ignoring God - harvests a crop of weeds. All he'll have to show for his life is weeds! But the one who plants in response to God, letting God's spirit do the growth work in him harvests a crop of real life, eternal life. So let's not allow ourselves to get fatigued doing good. At the right time we will harvest a good crop if we don't give up or quit. Right now therefore, every time we get the chance, let us work for the benefit of all, starting with those closest to us, in the community of faith. (The Message, Eugene Peterson).

What strikes me in this passage is Paul's encouragement to work for the benefit of all **every chance we get**, starting with those closest to us in the Salem community of faith. If we all consider what we can do for the benefit of Salem and our Lord, I am confident we will move ahead and will have an exciting future.

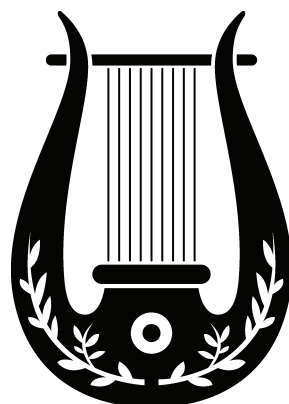

HARP

This multi-stringed music instrument is associated with David, who played to soothe King Saul and later wrote many Psalms. The harp also represents praise music in general, as well as all the instruments people use to glorify God (see Psalm 71:22). The idea that angels play harps comes from Revelation 14:2 ("And I heard a voice from heaven like the sound of...harpists playing on their harps").

Pastor Taylor also told the council that there are three types of ministry during pastoral vacancy:

Supply Pastor

The supply pastor is appropriate for congregations who need the essentials of worship, preaching, teaching and sacramental ministry continued until the new pastor arrives.

1. Works part-time
2. Usually paid on a per ministerial act compensation basis
3. Does not become involved in the call process.

Interim Pastor

The interim pastor is appropriate for congregations who have had one pastor for eight years or less with no preceding conflict or need to change the focus of ministry.

1. Provides part-time or full-time basic pastoral duties that maintain worship, preaching, teaching and sacramental ministry.
2. Teaching, committee ministry, visitations and funerals are done when appropriate within the time available.
3. Does not become involved in the call process

Interim Pastor/ Transition Specialist

The interim pastor/transition specialist is appropriate for congregations with a long preceding pastorate, areas of conflict or a need to assess and transform the focus of their ministry and is essential for senior pastor vacancies in multiple-staff churches.

1. Provides full range of pastoral duties to continue present level of ministry including worship, preaching, teaching, committee ministry, visitation, funerals and weddings. Involvement with council meeting and congregation communication is expected.
2. Assists the congregation in working through the five basic developmental tasks of the interim time which are to:
 - a. Acknowledge and understand the congregation's history and context.
 - b. Discover the identity and personality of the congregation today.
 - c. Identify and assist changes in leadership.
 - d. Assess and affirm partnerships with synod and churchwide ministries.
 - e. Prepare for new pastoral leadership.
3. Concentrates on goal setting, team building and problem solving.
4. Deals with specific grief, conflict, trust or other appropriate issues.
5. Works with the call process only when requested by the synod staff to ensure application of the above process. Does not become involved in the selection of a candidate.

None of the above shall be considered as a candidate for the permanent pastor position in the congregation.

The council unanimously chose to have an Interim Pastor/Transition Specialist and asked Pastor Taylor to start the process for us. Choosing the interim pastor is a council decision. When it is time to call a new pastor for Salem, the congregation will make that decision.

I pray that the members of Salem will be open to the leadership of the interim pastor/transition specialist. This is an opportunity for Salem to become a closer knit family and a time for this family to determine what our future holds.

ELCA WORLD HUNGER

Saturday, Sept. 24, my wife Doris and I attended a Hunger Training event at United in Christ Lutheran Church in Eveleth, MN. This event was sponsored by the Synod Hunger and Justice committee. Pastor Vicki Taylor from the Synod staff led a Bible Study on water issues in the Bible. Bishop Thomas Aitken preached at the closing worship service.

David Creech from the ELCA office of World Hunger gave the key note address. The emphasis was on how lack of clean water contributes to hunger and disease. 80% of the diseases in the developing world are caused by lack of clean water. The ELCA World Hunger program works with local people to help find solutions to preventing disease and growing more local food. Many humanitarian groups simply send food and that helps for the present but does not lead to longer term solutions. ELCA works to find long-term solutions so the people themselves can grow more of their own food and sustain themselves. Examples might be digging wells so people have access to clean water. In many places women have to walk up to 4 miles per day carrying water for their families. Through the Good Gifts program the ELCA gives chickens or other farm animals that help provide food and income. With chickens, families will have eggs and meat and can increase their flocks to share with others and even have income to buy food for their families. The manure will help their gardens and farms. It is the same with other gifts of animals.

The ELCA has also initiated a program to provide bed nets to prevent malaria. These bed nets are treated with insecticides and when used while sleeping can prevent a very high percentage of malaria. These bed nets cost about \$10. Where else can you save a life for \$10? Most of the people who get malaria are children under 5. When giving to ELCA World Hunger only 8% is used for administrative costs. Thus 92% goes directly to the people who need it.

There are very few if any other charities that have such low administrative costs.

BREAD FOR THE WORLD SUNDAY

You are invited to participate in Bread For the World's offering of letters on Sunday, October 23. Bread for the World is a non-partisan Christian lobbying organization which advocates for the poor and hungry. Bread for the World members have been writing letters to their senators, representatives and the president to encourage streamlining of foreign assistance programs. Some of these programs have not changed since the 1960's. This year many religious groups are praying for and advocating for a "Circle of Protection" around the poor so that budget cuts do not affect programs which have been successful in reducing poverty and hunger. More than 60 denominations and church organizations have signed on to form the Circle of Protection. Circle participants include a very diverse group which includes leaders from the U.S. Conference of Catholic bishops, The National Association of Evangelicals, The National Council of Churches, Sojourners, The National Hispanic Christian Leadership Conference, and the Salvation Army. Participants believe the moral measure of the budget debate is how the most poor and most vulnerable people fare. We look at every budget proposed from the bottom up--how it treats those called "the least of these".

LIVING BY SON-LIGHT

Some of our days seem very dark. Sickness, the death of a loved one, the loss of a job or another struggle overshadows life. In our despair, it can be difficult to sense God's presence. If God were here, surely he'd be shining his light on our dark circumstances.

When life is bright and joyous, it's easy to sense God; the sun becomes a natural metaphor for God's Son, Jesus, the Light of the world. But even on cloudy days, the sun still shines, its presence not bound by our limited vision. And in the darkest night, the sun remains; the warmth it gave before dusk lingers, enough to preserve us into the dawning of a new day. Sometimes we even catch its reflection in the moon.

"Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes with the morning" (Psalm 30:5b, NRSV). Trust in God; even in life's dark times, the Son still shines!

A COOKIE SMILE

Make these cheerful lollipop cookies to share.

What you need:

- An adult to help
- 1 roll of sugar cookie dough

8. Put cookies into bags and tie with a ribbon. Then give away these edible smiles!

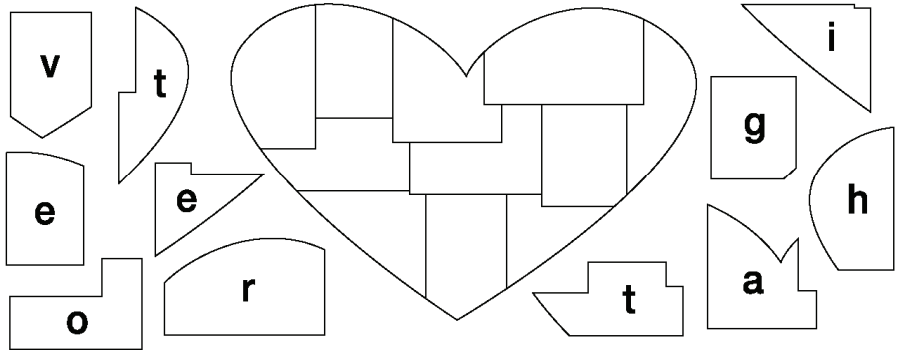

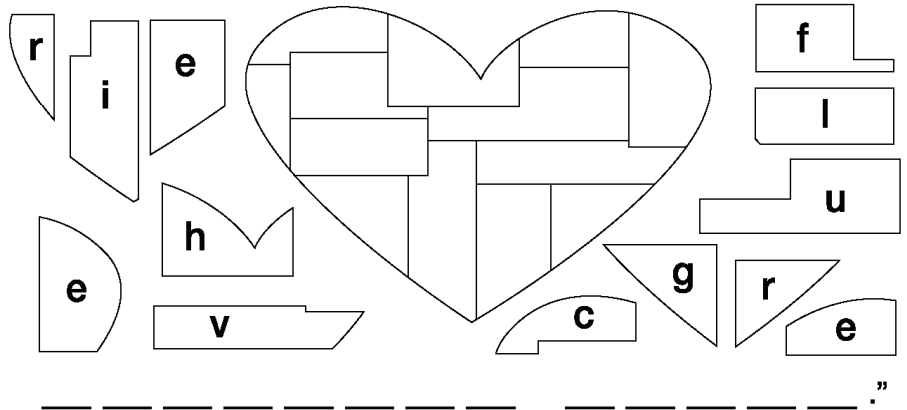
We can give in a variety of ways, including our money, possessions and time. But God says there’s only one attitude to have when we give.

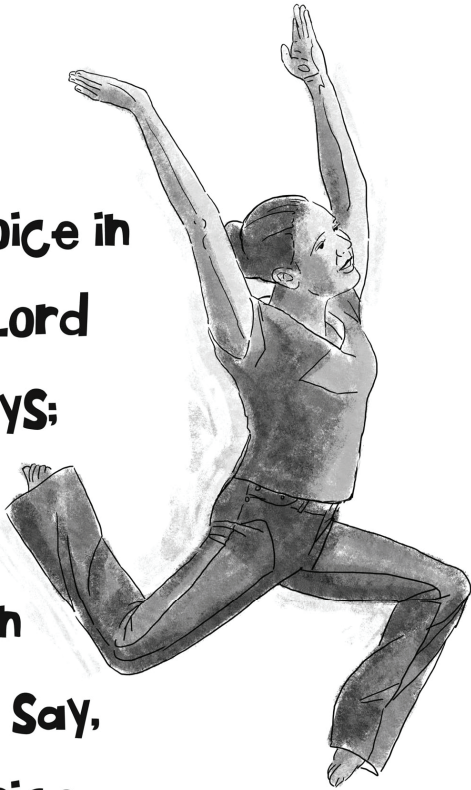
